

Do you empathize with Charlie's kidnappers at any point? Discuss their motives for the crime and their actions, both kind and cruel.

Author Leah Stewart offers psychological insights into

the audition process and the struggles of Hollywood, but she also shows us a very different set of pressures on the island where Charlie vacations. What role do these two settings play in the novel?

Compare the on-screen and off-screen romances. Are they similar? What draws Josie to Max after their time apart? What does she love about Charlie?

Why do you think

novel? Discuss her role
in the story and what you
imagine her backstory to be.

The novel opens with the quote "The actor's instrument . . . is himself; he works with the same emotional areas which he actually uses in real life." Discuss examples of the overlapping real and performed emotions. How


Discuss the portrayals of the lives of working actors in the book. What did or didn't surprise you about the acting profession?

SPIKED MILKSHAKES

"That Oreo milkshake sounds pretty damn good to me. When's the last time I had an Oreo milkshake?"

BOOZY OREO MILKSHAKE

½ cup milk

- 2 cups vanilla ice cream
- 4 Oreo cookies, plus one extra for garnish
- 1 ounce Kahlúa
- 1 ounce Baileys
- 1 ounce chocolate syrup Whipped cream
- 1. Place milk, ice cream, Oreo cookies, Kahlúa, Baileys, and chocolate syrup in a blender.
- 2. Blend on high until the mixture is smooth and creamy, with no lumps.
- 3. Pour mixture into serving glasses.
- 4. Garnish with extra Oreos and whipped cream.

Serve immediately. Serves: 2

MINT CHOCOLATE CHIP MILKSHAKE

½ cup milk

- 1 scoop mint chocolate chip ice cream
- 1/4 cup Baileys
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 ice cubes Whipped cream **Sprinkles**
- 1. Place milk, ice cream, Baileys, vanilla, and ice cubes in a blender and mix until fully combined and creamy.
- 2. Pour into tall glasses.
- 3. Top with whipped cream and sprinkles.
